Anthony J. Hood Chairman (Term Expiration: February 3, 2022) Anthony J. Hood has served on the first served as Chairman of the Zoni Chairman since 2007. He is the Chie Operations Branch. of the U.S. Envir

Anthony J. Hood has served on the District of Columbia Zoning Commission since 1998. He first served as Chairman of the Zoning Commission in 2000 and has currently served as Chairman since 2007. He is the Chief of the Printing and Mail Management Section, Facilities Operations Branch, of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in Washington, DC. Mr. Hood is the Former President of the Woodridge Civic Association and the Woodridge Civic Fund. After

20 years of service he was voted emeritus. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Bryant Park Homeowners Association and is a Member of the 5th District's Citizens Advisory Council and the Bryant/Channing Streets Orange Hat Patrol. Mr. Hood is both a life-long member and Deacon of the Greater First Baptist Church of Washington, DC and resident of Ward 5. He has a Bachelor of Science in Printing Management from the University of the District of Columbia and was educated in the District's Public Education System.



Robert Miller Vice Chairman (Term Expiration: February 3, 2025)

Robert Miller has served on the Zoning Commission since October 2012. Mr. Miller previously served as the Deputy Director of the Mayor's Office of Policy and Legislative Affairs, and prior to that he spent over 25 years as the legislative counsel to the DC Council Chairman. During his tenure at the Council, Mr. Miller was the staff person primarily responsible for oversight of land

use matters, including public hearings and Council adoption of five major legislative measures amending the administration of the major legislative measures amending the Comprehensive Plan, with which the District's Charter requires zoning to be "not inconsistent." Mr. Miller also served on the National Capital Planning Commission from 1985-2014; as the DC Council Chairman's alternate representative from 1985-2010; as a Mayoral appointee during 2011-2014, and as the Commission's elected vice-chair from 2007-2014. A longstanding member of the DC Bar, Mr. Miller has a B.A. from Hamilton College and a J.D. from George Washington University. He is a third generation native Washingtonian.



Peter Shapiro District Resident (Term Expiration: February 3, 2023)

Peter Shapiro is the Executive Director of the Revenue Authority of Prince George's County. Mr. Shapiro is a former member and two-term chair of the Prince George's County Council, which also acts as the County's District Council, governing land use and zoning. Mr. Shapiro grew up in Washington, DC and returned to the District in 2009. From 2014 to 2016, he served as elected Commissioner and Treasurer, District of Columbia ANC 3/4G. Mr. Shapiro is also an executive coach and consultant for MBA, EMBA, and senior executive leadership development programs

at IMD (Switzerland), SKOLKOVO (Russia), and CEIBS (China) business schools, and is an adjunct faculty member for the University of Maryland's Master of Real Estate Development Program. Mr. Shapiro is also the founder and former director of the Rawlings Center for Public Leadership at the University of Maryland. In 1995 he was awarded the Truman Scholarship for Leadership and Public Service.

DC Values to Consider During CWC Reviews

Review of Current Guidance





District of Columbia Facilities and Commemorative Expressions (DCFACES)

Mayor Bowser's Working Group emphasized discouraging commemoration of subjects that participated in slavery, systemic racism, mistreatment of, or actions that suppressed equality for, persons of color, women and LGBTQ communities and violation of the DC Human Rights Act.

Diverse Washingtonians Commemorative Works Amendment Act of 2020

The University of the District of Columbia shall recommend, "up to 12 proposed commemorative works to honor remarkable diverse native Washingtonians, or persons who made Washington their home, who left positive and indelible marks on American or District culture or history. The individuals shall reflect diversity of culture, race, gender or gender identity, sexual orientation, or disability status."

Real Estate + Artists + Engagement = Public Art

01 Sites named after Historical Events or Individuals Lafayette-Pointer Recreation Center



As part of a renovation of the building in 2021, the name "Pointer" was added to the recreation center and park to honor Captain George Pointer, who was born into slavery in 1773 and purchased his freedom at age 19. His family later settled on the land where the recreation center and park stand. His family was among early African-American landowners from the 1830s until 1928, when their homes were taken by eminent domain to build Lafayette Elementary School and Lafayette Park.

To acknowledge this past, Historic Chevy Chase DC (HCCDC) worked with HPO to approve signage and CM Todd proposed a bill to rename the facility and park.

Target and the U.S. Soccer Foundation partnered on a mission to transform neighborhoods with soccer mini-pitches. They included new signages to recognize the history of each place.



Art installations honoring events or individualsOxon Run Basketball Courts

Dedicated by Steve Francis, former NBA All-Star and founder of the Steve Francis Foundation, to honor the anniversary of the "March on Washington." The mural was installed to raise awareness of voting rights, civil and racial equity by using his platform and standing in solidarity with other professional athletes calling racial justice.

Chuck Brown Day, which occurs yearly, commemorates the life legacy and music of DC legend - the Godfather of Go-Go, Chuck Brown with musical performances of local Go-Go bands.

The event occurs in the Chuck Brown Memorial Park, which features a homage to Brown with a curved, inscribed memorial wall at the park entrance, where visitors can learn about his legacy.

The first African American women's golf club in the U.S. also started in Washington, in August 1936 Holen Wehb Harris invited twelve women to her house to discuss starting a women's golf club. The founding members of the club, known as the Wake Robin Golf Club, were predominately the voices of the Royal Golf Club who were tired of staying home on the weekends while their husbands played golf.
