<p>OS-0326-12</p>	<p><u>Euthanasia Course Proposal</u></p> <p><i><u>Proposed by HRA:</u></i></p> <p>In accordance with regulations, veterinary technicians seeking to apply for euthanasia privileges must complete Board approved 16 hours of coursework which includes:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) Eight (8) hours of pharmacology and proper administration and storage of euthanasia solutions; (2) Two (2) hours of Federal and District laws regulating the storage and accountability of euthanasia solutions; (3) Four (4) hours of euthanasia compassion fatigue management; and (4) Two (2) hours of disposal of euthanized animals <p><i>To meet these educational requirements, HRA has proposed the development of a course with the following components and requests for the Board’s review.</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Enroll our technicians onto the DC Health board approved ‘euthanasia by injection’ course delivered by the University of Florida. This is a 14-hour course and covers the required elements as described in the DC Health euthanasia tech registration requirements. • The final two hours of training to ensure the 16 hours of training is met, will be delivered in-house by Dr Ashley Etue. Dr. Etue has completed the entire euthanasia course with the University of Florida and is qualified to deliver practical training in-house. This practical element of our course will take the knowledge gained from the UF theoretical course and apply this to our processes in house. This course will cover all practical elements of euthanasia including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Confirmation of the correct animal, and checklists • Safe handling of the animal

Each technician will be required to watch two euthanasia, successfully assist in two euthanasia, and then successfully perform two under supervision. Once they have completed this element of the course they will be signed off and will submit this certificate, alongside the UF 14 hour certificate, to yourselves at DC health.</p>

The findings are then used to update the NAVLE blueprint, keeping the assessment aligned with the skills and competencies expected of newly licensed veterinarians.</p> <p><u>ICVA Assessment Development Committee</u></p> <p>The ICVA is putting out a call for nominations for four (4) open positions on the Assessment Development Committee (ADC) with the term beginning in June 2026. - USDA has designated a **record 243 shortage areas across 46 states** for FY2025.
- Veterinarians report that the program significantly reduces debt pressure and expands access to veterinary services in underserved regions.

Applications Open: VMLRP & VSGP

- The **2026 application cycle** for both programs is now open.
- USDA’s NIFA expects **about \$18 million** in FY26 funding to address food-animal and rural veterinary shortages.
- The **Veterinary Services Grant Program (VSGP)** is also accepting applications.

Animal Health Update: H5N1 in Wisconsin

- USDA confirmed **highly pathogenic avian influenza (H5N1)** in a Wisconsin dairy herd.
- The case involved a **distinct D1.1 genotype** linked to **wildlife spillover**, not cattle movement.
- No clinical signs were observed, and there is **no evidence of spread to other farms**.

Advocacy Tools & Engagement

- The **AVMA Congressional Advocacy Network (CAN)** offers a resource library to help veterinarians engage effectively with policymakers.
- Members can now sign up for **CAN text alerts** for quick action updates.

Veterinary Euthanasia Technician Regulations

The new Veterinary Technician and Euthanasia Technicians regulations became effective Friday, August 6, 2021. At this time, the DC Department of Health will not be issuing registrations until the process is in place.

The Department of Health is currently creating the platform by which individuals can submit an application for registration as either a Veterinary Technician or a Veterinary Euthanasia Technician. Once the platform is available, there will be a grace period for which individuals will need to come into full compliance.

11202 EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

11202.1 Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, an applicant for veterinary technician certification shall furnish proof satisfactory to the Board that the applicant has successfully graduated from a two (2) year associate program in the practice of veterinary technology or animal health at an institution accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) Committee on Veterinary Technician Education and Activities (CVTEA) at the time the applicant graduated.

11203 NATIONAL EXAMINATION

11203.1 To qualify for certification, an applicant shall furnish proof of having obtained, no more than seven (7) years prior to the submission of a certification application under this chapter, a passing score on the Veterinary Technician National Examination (VTNE) or its successor examination, administered by the American Association of Veterinary State Boards (AAVSB) or its successor.

11203.2 The passing score for the VTNE shall be as established by AAVSB.

11203.3 An applicant shall arrange for the score to be transmitted to the Board directly from AAVSB.

11204 KNOWLEDGE OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA VETERINARY JURISPRUDENCE

11204.1 To qualify for certification under this section, an applicant shall demonstrate to the Board’s satisfaction that he or she possesses competent knowledge and understanding of the laws and rules pertaining to veterinary practice in the District. The Board may adopt or implement a District of Columbia Veterinary Jurisprudence Examination or other methods such as mandatory educational sessions.

11205 ALTERNATIVE QUALIFICATION THROUGH EDUCATION AND TRAINING

11205.1 Notwithstanding the requirement of § 11202, an applicant who does not meet the requirement of § 11202.1 may qualify for a veterinary technician certification if he or she:

(a) Has completed, with a minimum passing grade of C or equivalent, at least two-hundred and thirty (230) clock hours of post-secondary instruction relevant to the practice of veterinary technician, which includes:

- (1) Biology I;
- (2) Biology II;
- (3) Microbiology;
- (4) Chemistry;
- (5) Anatomy and physiology I; and
- (6) Anatomy and physiology II; and

(b) Has accrued at least four thousand (4,000) hours of Directed Clinical Practice under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian
