AVMA UPDATES – FYI

Federal Advocacy Highlights

1. AVMA & SAVMA Push for Action on Xylazine and Rural Veterinary Workforce

Over 120 veterinary professionals traveled to Washington, D.C., meeting with nearly 150 congressional offices. Their priorities:

- **Protect veterinary access to xylazine**, an essential sedative.
- **Support recruitment and retention** of veterinarians in rural and underserved communities.

2. Combating Illicit Xylazine Act

The veterinary community is urging Congress to pass this bill, which aims to:

- Give law enforcement tools to address **illicit xylazine use** tied to the opioid crisis.
- **Preserve legal, veterinary access** to prescription xylazine. AVMA President Dr. Michael Bailey recently emphasized these points in an Agri-Pulse op-ed.

3. Former AVMA Vice President Testifies Before Senate

Dr. Gary Brown spoke before the U.S. Senate Small Business and Entrepreneurship Committee, highlighting:

- The veterinary profession’s economic importance.
- The need to strengthen the rural veterinary workforce.
- The urgency of maintaining access to xylazine.

State Advocacy Updates

The AVMA and state VMAs are tracking legislation on licensure, noneconomic damages, telemedicine, and the VCPR. Key developments include:

Licensure

- **Indiana:** Enacted reciprocity for out-of-state applicants.
- **Connecticut:** Proposed temporary permits for internationally trained graduates.
- **Colorado:** Introduced a bill to expedite licensure by endorsement and create a **drug donation program**.

Noneconomic Damages

- **Rhode Island:** Proposed allowing up to **\$7,500** in noneconomic damages for intentional or negligent harm to pets.

Telemedicine

- **Georgia:** Proposed restricting telemedicine without a VCPR to veterinarians only.
- **West Virginia:** Introduced a bill removing the annual in-person visit requirement for telemedicine.

The **Rural Veterinary Workforce Act** aims to:

- Address shortages in high-need areas.
- Reduce the burden of student loan debt for veterinarians serving rural communities.

AVMA-championed xylazine legislation moves forward in Congress

On March 26, the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee advanced the Combating Illicit Xylazine Act with an overwhelmingly strong bipartisan vote.

	<p>Strongly endorsed by the AVMA, the bill now goes to the full Senate for consideration.</p> <p><u>Recent US Supreme Court rulings and the VCPR</u></p> <p>The U.S. Supreme Court recently made two decisions on speech and conduct. First, in March, it issued a decision in <i>Chiles v. Salazar</i> dealing with First Amendment rights generally, and then in April, it denied a petition to review the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals decision in <i>Hines v. Pardue</i>, which dealt with a First Amendment challenge to the VCPR in Texas as applied to a single veterinarian. OS-0521-17	<p><u>AAVSB UPDATES – FYI</u></p> <p><u>VAULT Price Increases for 2026</u></p> <p>The AAVSB Board of Directors has approved updated pricing for 2026. VAULT Basic will increase by \$5, while VAULT Premium will see a larger increase—now \$260 per destination for veterinarians and \$220 for veterinary technicians, effective February 17.</p> <p><u>VAULT Primary Source Transcripts</u></p> <p>Many licensees already have verified transcripts stored in the VIVA database, which count as primary source documents. However, some jurisdictions still require transcripts to be sent directly from the issuing</p>	

school or transcript service. Because of this, VAULT Premium packets will no longer include transcripts for those jurisdictions.

Licensees will now need to pay for any additional transcript copies if a board does not accept the AAVSB-verified version in VIVA—costs that AAVSB previously covered.

The new Veterinary Technician and Euthanasia Technicians regulations became effective Friday, August 6, 2021. At this time, the DC Department of Health will not be issuing registrations until the process is in place.

The Department of Health is currently creating the platform by which individuals can submit an application for registration as either a Veterinary Technician or a Veterinary Euthanasia Technician. Once the platform is available, there will be a grace period for which individuals will need to come into full compliance.

VETERINARY TECHNICIAN LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS

11202 EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

11202.1 Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, an applicant for veterinary technician certification shall furnish proof satisfactory to the Board that the applicant has successfully graduated from a two (2) year associate program in the practice of veterinary technology or animal health at an institution accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) Committee on Veterinary Technician Education and Activities (CVTEA) at the time the applicant graduated.

11203 NATIONAL EXAMINATION

11203.1 To qualify for certification, an applicant shall furnish proof of having obtained, no more than seven (7) years prior to the submission of a

certification application under this chapter, a passing score on the Veterinary Technician National Examination (VTNE) or its successor examination, administered by the American Association of Veterinary State Boards (AAVSB) or its successor.

11203.2 The passing score for the VTNE shall be as established by AAVSB.

11203.3 An applicant shall arrange for the score to be transmitted to the Board directly from AAVSB.

11204 KNOWLEDGE OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA VETERINARY JURISPRUDENCE

11204.1 To qualify for certification under this section, an applicant shall demonstrate to the Board’s satisfaction that he or she possesses competent knowledge and understanding of the laws and rules pertaining to veterinary practice in the District. The Board may adopt or implement a District of Columbia Veterinary Jurisprudence Examination or other methods such as mandatory educational sessions.

11205 ALTERNATIVE QUALIFICATION THROUGH EDUCATION AND TRAINING

11205.1 Notwithstanding the requirement of § 11202, an applicant who does not meet the requirement of § 11202.1 may qualify for a veterinary technician certification if he or she:

(a) Has completed, with a minimum passing grade of C or equivalent, at least two-hundred and thirty (230) clock hours of post-secondary instruction relevant to the practice of veterinary technician, which includes:

- (1) Biology I;
- (2) Biology II;
- (3) Microbiology;
- (4) Chemistry;
- (5) Anatomy and physiology I; and
- (6) Anatomy and physiology II; and
