i. Client Communication and Education:

- Chatbots powered by Al can provide instant answers to common petrelated questions.
- Educational resources can be personalized based on an individual pet's needs.

ii. Natural Language Processing (NLP):

- NLP algorithms can analyze veterinary literature, case reports, and clinical notes to extract relevant information.
- Veterinarians can benefit from Al-generated summaries and recommendations.

iii. Diagnostics and Imaging:

Al algorithms can analyze medical images (such as X-rays, MRIs, and ultrasounds) to assist veterinarians in diagnosing conditions like fractures, tumors, or organ abnormalities.

iv. Predictive Analytics:

- Al models can predict disease outbreaks, track disease trends, and assess risk factors in animal populations for example, predicting the spread of infectious diseases or identifying at-risk animals for preventive measures.





v. Treatment Planning:

- Al can recommend personalized treatment plans based on an individual animal's health history, genetics, and response to previous treatments.
- It can also suggest optimal drug dosages and monitor treatment effectiveness.

vi. Health Monitoring:

- Wearable devices and sensors equipped with AI can continuously monitor vital signs, detect anomalies, and alert veterinarians to potential health issues.
- This real-time monitoring enhances early disease detection and intervention.

vii. Research and Drug Discovery:

- Al assists in analyzing large datasets, identifying genetic markers, and predicting drug interactions.
- It accelerates research and drug development for both animals and humans.

viii. Population Health Management:

- Al helps track population health trends, assess vaccination coverage, and manage disease control programs.

	The current Veterinary Reference Form lacks detail, requiring only the names and contact information of the applicant's professional referees. To gain deeper insight into an applicant's professional character, a new, more comprehensive form—modeled after the Board of Medicine's version—has been developed. The Board is now tasked with deciding whether to implement this updated form.	
OS-0717-13	CEU REQUIREMENTS FOR LICENSES TRANSITIONING TO BIRTH MONTH/BIRTH YEAR RENEWAL CYCLE	
	Board Action	
	To determine whether and how the Board should prorate or adjust the required Continuing Education Unit (CEU) hours for licensees whose renewal	





cycles have been shortened due to the transition to a birth month/birth year renewal schedule. **Background** All health professional licensing boards in the District of Columbia transitioned to a birth month/birth year-based renewal cycle. This change was implemented to improve administrative efficiency and simplify license tracking for both the Board and licensees. As a result of this transition, some licensees have received license terms of less than the standard two years. This presents a challenge, as the Board's current policy assumes a two-year license cycle when evaluating CEU compliance. Given that CEUs are a requirement for license renewal, the Board must now determine an equitable policy for the affected licensees that ensures fairness while maintaining the integrity of continuing education expectations and public protection. One proposed recommendation is that affected licensees be required to complete 50% of the standard CEU hours, including all mandatory content areas (such as LGBTQ+ cultural competency and DC Health public health priorities). The new Veterinary Technician and Euthanasia Technicians regulations became effective Friday, August 6, 2021. At this time, the DC Department of Health will not be issuing registrations until the process is in place.

The Department of Health is currently creating the platform by which individuals can submit an application for registration as either a Veterinary Technician or a Veterinary Euthanasia Technician. Once the platform is available, there will be a grace period for which individuals will need to come into full compliance.

11202 EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

11202.1 Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, an applicant for veterinary technician certification shall furnish proof satisfactory to the Board that the applicant has successfully graduated from a two (2) year associate program in the practice of veterinary technology or animal health at an institution accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) Committee on Veterinary Technician Education and Activities (CVTEA) at the time the applicant graduated.

11203 NATIONAL EXAMINATION

11203.1 To qualify for certification, an applicant shall furnish proof of having obtained, no more than seven (7) years prior to the submission of a certification application under this chapter, a passing score on the Veterinary Technician National Examination (VTNE) or its successor examination, administered by the American Association of Veterinary State Boards (AAVSB) or its successor.

11203.2 The passing score for the VTNE shall be as established by AAVSB.

11203.3 An applicant shall arrange for the score to be transmitted to the Board directly from AAVSB.

11204 KNOWLEDGE OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA VETERINARY JURISPRUDENCE

11204.1 To qualify for certification under this section, an applicant shall demonstrate to the Board's satisfaction that he or she possesses competent knowledge and understanding of the laws and rules pertaining to veterinary practice in the District. The Board may adopt or implement a District of





Columbia Veterinary Jurisprudence Examination or other methods such as mandatory educational sessions.

11205 ALTERNATIVE QUALIFICATION THROUGH EDUCATION AND TRAINING

- **11205.1** Notwithstanding the requirement of § 11202, an applicant who does not meet the requirement of § 11202.1 may qualify for a veterinary technician certification if he or she:
- (a) Has completed, with a minimum passing grade of C or equivalent, at least two-hundred and thirty (230) clock hours of post-secondary instruction relevant to the practice of veterinary technician, which includes:
- (1) Biology I;
- (2) Biology II;
- (3) Microbiology;
- (4) Chemistry;
- (5) Anatomy and physiology I; and
- (6) Anatomy and physiology II; and
- (b) Has accrued at least four thousand (4,000) hours of Directed Clinical Practice under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian

This month, we also launched a series of free microchip clinics, helping ensure that more pets in our community can be reunited with their families if they ever become lost. With the overwhelming majority of the animals in our care coming in as strays, owner reunifications are a critical part of our work. We're proud to have microchipped more than 191 pets at these free clinics!

A special highlight in May was welcoming **Dogs Playing for Life, a national nonprofit dedicated to enriching the lives of shelter dogs.** Their team spent a week with us, training our staff and volunteers on the powerful impact of playgroups. This new approach is already transforming the way our dogs





socialize–boosting their overall well-being and increasing their chances of adoption. We will continue to look for opportunities to provide valuable training like this as an investment into our team and the animals who count on us.
