Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System (YRBSS)



National, State and Local YRBS

- Biennial survey
- Sample of schools and students
- 99-question high school survey
- 49-question middle school survey (optional)
- 66 percent of state and local questionnaires must match the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) standard questionnaire, ensuring comparability

Depression

A new question was added to the District YRBS in 2021 - During the past 30 days, <u>how often was your mental health not good?</u> (Poor mental health includes stress, anxiety and depression.)

- 25.6 percent of female middle school students and 11.9 percent of male middle school students report poor mental health.
- 33.8 percent of female high school students and 15.3 percent of male high school students report poor mental health.

Suicidality

- 28 percent of middle school students have ever <u>seriously</u> <u>thought about killing themselves</u>.
 - The breakdown between males and females demonstrates significant difference in risk, with females' suicidal thoughts doubling those of their male peers (37 percent of middle school females and 18 percent of males).
- At the high school level, <u>females also demonstrate significantly</u> <u>higher rates of suicidal ideation</u> than their male peers, with 25 percent of high school females having seriously considered attempting suicide in the 12 months prior to the survey compared to 10 percent of high school males.

Mental Health by Sexual Orientation

The mental health of LGB youth also shows concerning trends:

- <u>Suicidality</u> is significantly higher among lesbian, gay, bisexual, questioning or other sexual identity students (LGBQ+) than heterosexual students at both the middle and high school levels.
 - Middle school students who identify as LGBQ+ are 2.8 times as likely to attempt suicide as their heterosexual peers.
 - LGBQ+ high school students are 2.4 times as likely as their heterosexual peers to experience suicidality and three times as likely to experience poor mental health compared to their heterosexual peers.
